




#### FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK...

#### **FAsCE India**

#### Genesis

Fransalian Agency for Social Care and Education in India (FAsCE India) is a grassroots development organization working in Northeastern region of India. Founded in 2005 it is the official development organ of Missionaries of St Francis De Sales (MSFS) for Northeast.

It is registered under Registration of Societies' Registration Act 1860{ No. SR/FASCE -2005} and has a FCRA number.

#### Vision

Creation of a just and equitable, peaceful and prosperous society, rooted in the firm faith and collective conviction in the capacity of persons towards socio-economic development and individual well being of all, particularly the underprivileged.

#### Mission

Ensuring personal empowerment and social development of the marginalized - rural and urban, tribal and non-tribal - population of the North East India through creating awareness, transforming attitudes, availing opportunities and initiating activities.

#### **Objectives**

- > To create an economically better off, socially enlightened and culturally comprehensive society in which every individual and family has 'enough for its needs'.
- ➤ To foster a process of ongoing change in favour of the rural poor in a way in which they can sustain this process through building and managing appropriate local level institutions rooted in values of justice, equity and mutual support.
- To promote and propagate strategies through which the full potential of women, children and youth are realized.
- To influence public policies in favour of the poor.
- > To strengthen networks and linkages between and among formal and non-formal institutions that can foster and sustain the impact of development initiatives.

#### Areas of Operation

The target area of FAsCE India covers the entire North East region of India - comprising the states of Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram, Meghalaya, Nagaland, Tripura and Galsi in West Bengal.



#### REPORT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2010 - 2011

#### Programme approaches of Fransalian Agency for Social Care and Education, India [FAsCE India]

As a registered NGO, FAsCE India has been actively involved in the uplift of the poor and the marginalized section of the society. Promotion and formation of Community Based Organizations (CBO), especially among women was given a new thrust during the year Women empowerment is the main goal of the integrated community development programme. The Communities of women have realized the importance of savings and credit. Vocational skill development programme has increased the employability of the youth and the



programs have helped many a young school dropout youth to find employment and thereby enhancing the dignity of person. Sponsorship program has facilitated the continuity of formal education of several poor children and has helped some of them pursue higher or professional education.

#### 1. CHILD LABOUR - MAIN FOCUS DURING THE YEAR 2010 -11

FAsCE India provided a new focus on the Right to Education and health development of children engaged in the Tea Estates of Choibari, Chapar and Krishnakali of Dhubri district of Assam, State of India. The project titled "Community Sensitization Program on Children's Rights with Special Focus to Child Labour issue in the three tea gardens of Dhubri District of Assam" was successfully implemented. The project has not only addressed the issue of child rights in Assam, but succeeded in providing quality education to affected children and has engaged the stakeholders for advocacy on child rights since the past one year.

#### 1.2 Project Goal

Increasing the awareness on the Rights of children in the 3 Tea Gardens of Dhubri District, Assam; and reduction of Child labour in these Tea gardens by September 2011.

#### 1.3 Objective:

- 100% parents are aware of the children's right.
- Child labour in 3 Tea Gardens is reduced to 60%.

#### 1.4 Activities:

- Awareness program for parents on children's right in the context of the Tea Gardens.
- Awareness program for children on children's right in the context of the Tea Gardens.
- Neighbourhood discussion on different rights of children.



- ◆ Focus group discussion on specific rights of children and violation of rights in the Tea Gardens.
- ♦ Inter personal communication family visit and interaction with families.
- ◆ Baseline survey.
- ◆ Identifying the children's right that are violated.
- ♦ Identifying the families practicing child labour
- ♦ Listing the different types of child abuse with details of children working in the tea gardens
- ♦ Workshop for the parents of children working in the garden
- ♦ Workshop for the children working in the garden
- \* Rally on stopping child labour in the garden, factories and at home

The project activities and implementation methodology have been designed professionally to address the child rights issues of 2673 children of 1306 families. It would indirectly influence 5548 population in 3 tea gardens.

#### 1.5 Project orientation and capacity building for staff

A Two-day training programme on Orientation and capacity building for the eight project staff was conducted on 4th and 5th Nov. 2010 at SFS School, Bahalpur. Mr. Jonas Lakra, State Zonal Officer, Caritas India was the main resource person. Regional coordinator Fr. Cornelius highlighted the aim and objectives of the Project and the purpose of the program. The program has capacitated the staff and has rightly motivated them to achieve the desired objectives.



# 1.6 Awareness programme for children on Children's Right in the context of Tea Gardens

This programme was implemented with the collaboration and support of the local village, Government leaders and officials, and the staff of the three tea gardens. Mrs. Rita Tigga, Gram Panchayat Ward member and Anganwadi, the nurse of tea garden Choibari and Mr. Rajen Horo, Ancholic president of All Adivasi Students' Association of Assam (AASAA) Choibari were the resource persons. Mr. Welfred Topno, President of All Adivasi Sahitya Assam, Mr. Godfrey, Nawa Bihan Samaj, Adivasi Cultural dress wings North Lakhimpur, Mr. Clement Kerketta SBSS staff, and Mr. Stephen Ekka, Director of PAJHRA Tezpur shared their rich experiences and reflections on the topic with the participants. There were 91 participants, 49 male and 42 female. It was an eye opener to all on the prevailing condition of the Rights of Children in the Tea Gardens.

# 1.7 Focus group discussion on specific Rights of Children; and the Rights of Children that are violated in the Tea Gardens

Focus Group Discussions were conducted separately for children in the two Tea Estates of Chapar and Krishnakali on

24th and 27th March 2011. There were 135 participants. The objective of the programme was to facilitate the children in fruitful discussion to bring to awareness on the violation of Rights; the ways to enter in to dialogue with violators; and the various ways to capacitate everyone to recognize Children Rights, and to respond positively. Fr. Cornelius presented the themes very systematically, which gave a clear awareness on the various rights of the children. The participants were



empowered to share information and ideas for the creation of greater awareness among all.

FAsCE India staff introduced action songs to motivate the children, and children were involved in developing the themes through activities and games. The children were very happy and extended their cooperation whole heartedly. The children were helped to take responsibilities; and to develop positive attitudes and respond to love and treatment they receive from their parents.

#### 2. Integrated Rural Development and Women's Empowerment (IRD & WE)

Integrated community development programme has been implemented in different parts of the region. Women are the main stakeholders of the programme. Interventions were made for the Promotion and formation of SHG, facilitating members to link with

financial institutions, leadership development, and functional literacy. Following projects were implemented with an emphasis on issues:

Formation of Self Help Group (SHGs) with focus on a) women SHGs

Organizing and strengthening the existing SHGs into b) federation



- Various skills development training on Income Generating Activities (IGAs) C)
- Assistance for establishment of IGA and follow up. d)
- Advocating rights through PRI, RTI and NREGA.

FAsCE India believes that long term socio economic development of the rural society can be realized only through an integrated and sustainable development of the people from the marginalized section of the society. These marginalized sections comprise people from low-income groups, and those coming from diverse communities of tribals, adivasis and minorities. The integrated programme pivots on participatory approach and on the belief that true social transformation happens through community participation. The participatory approach alone can build up the ownership of the community and responsibility that each one holds for one's own action and development.

2.1 Community Development Programme through village institution in Dhubri district of Assam

The intervention is aimed at strengthening the SHGs and federations. Though the Grant- period ended in March of 2009, the Organization continued the programme. The emphasis was on making the SHG federations to function as CBOs for the area to sustain the development agenda.

The details of the project achievements are as follows:

#### 2.5 PIG BANK

An innovative programme to encourage self employment and self help among the poor women of Chappar village of Dhubri District is being organised by FAsCE India. It is named "PIG BANK". Each family under this programme are given a pigling which they rear and later they gift piglings to another poor family who does the same and the programme is continued.

#### The Programme

Rearing pigs is a common income generating activity in this locality. Many families carry out this income generation programme in a small level, which helps them to earn an additional income. Besides, pork is in great demand among the local people here.

Five poor interested families from Chappar, a poor village of Dhubri District, Assam, India were selected as beneficiaries of this programme. The selection was done by the people themselves through the Women Self Help Groups functioning in the locality under the leadership of FAsCE India. The privilege was offered to those women who were hard working, regular for the weekly group meetings and willing to collaborate with the programme.

Piglings were distributed during the month of January 2011 and they are looked after well and they are growing up. When a family receives pigling, they will be also allotted another family, to whom they have to gift a pigling. Similarly, these families will be able to gift piglings to other families and the pig bank is continued.

There is also a close follow up as the families who gift the piglings, have to see that the other takes care of it and in due course, continue to gift the same to another selected family.

This programme promote solidarity, cooperation and build up a relationship and caring society along with financial enhancement among the targeted families.

People are happy and cooperate with the programme. They also expressed to have more of this sort of activities that is interesting and helping them to earn.

#### Community Development Programme through village institution in Manikbond, Karimganj District of Assam

FAsCE India has been working with the families in Manikbond, Karimganj district of Assam. The project aims at women empowerment through literacy promotion, formation of SHGs, Federations and various awareness programmes. Skill training programmes like tailoring and embroidery, wool knitting, training on animal husbandry, Fishery are conducted to empower the women in skills and knowledge so as to enhance their income. Number about 129 SHGs with 1200 women.



#### 3.1 Supplementary Education Centres:

Twenty Supplementary education centres were functioning in the villages. These centres have given a new life to 800 children studying from class 1 to IV. It has been a great support for the poor children to enhance their education and overall development. Through this programme, the problem of children dropping out from school education is prevented. The project has

succeeded in improving the educational performance of many

children.

#### 3.2 Income Generating Activities of SHG:

SHGs are continuing their income generating enterprises. Details are given below.

#### 4. Adult Literacy Campaign among Adivasi women in West Siang

FAsCE India is continuing the working among the Adi women of West Siang district in Aruncahal Pradesh. The programme was started in 2008 with the support from CMC-AMA/MM.

Classes on topics such as Gender inequality, Responsible Parenthood, Early Marriage, Alcoholism/Drinking Habits and other topics were dealt at length through discussions and interactive sessions. Such sessions gave the women knowledge, openness and awareness to matters of common issues. They began to cultivate a sense of common concern and ability to respond to such situations for Empowerment that proceeds from knowledge, skills, and self confidence.

#### 4.1 Intervention results:

- 185 women were sensitized and taught to read and Write.
- Educated the women folk on various matters concerning their day to day life.
- Sensitized them about different social issues.

#### Holistic Education Programme (HEP)

Education of the heart is the heart of education. Education is one of the indicators of Human Development and a crucial factor in social empowerment, which is largely reflected in the literacy status of a State or a particular area. The social benefit of literacy attainment is much higher than its economic return. Literacy generates awareness and builds personality in such a way as to promote development and welfare of a nation and its people. However, the disparity in the education system as well as the facilities and avenues greatly deprive the oppressed and marginalized from



getting good education. The education imparted in the rural areas, compared to the Urban, presents a wide gap in quality of education, the low enrollment of children in the schools and drop outs of schools - shows the difference in education pattern. The women and girl children are often deprived proper primary education.

FAsCE India, since its inception has been rendering holistic education to the children in its own schools and college.

The basic programmes of the organization under HEP are

- Formal education
- → Non formal education
- Educational Sponsorship Programme Fransalian Kinder Mission (FKM)

#### 5.1 Formal Education

FAsCE India runs 33 educational Institutions at primary, higher secondary & college level with intake capacity of 19340 students in Northeast India and West Bengal. FAsCE India continues to stress the importance of the following:

- Promoting Child Rights and value education for social change
- Educational counseling in schools
- Seminars for teachers and students
- Career Guidance courses


#### 6. Construction of SFS School at Umwahlang

FAsCE India has been keenly involved in the education of the poor and the marginalized. Through the village schools, it has reached out to the poor children of remote villages, providing them quality education. The journey of 'reaching to the unreached', continues on. The opening of a centre at Umwahlang in 2008, a remote village in the district of Nongstoin, rated as one of the poorest areas of Meghalya, was another expression of this commitment to the poor and the marginalized. Moreover, the educational and communication facilities are minimal.

With the goal of providing quality education to the poor tribal children of the area, FAsCE India has started the process of constructing a primary school at Umwahlang in 2009. The work has been intensified during the 2010-2011. It is expected to be completed by Feb 2012. The numerous villages of Khasi tribal community surrounding Umwahlang village is the target group and the beneficiaries. FAsCE India shares the hope of the people and helps the people to dream big things. Someone dares to dream! Together, dreams are realized.

#### 7. Non-formal and Vocational Skill Development

Vocational skill training programmes are conducted in two centres: SFS Technical School Diphu and Imphal. Programs are aimed at enhancing the employability and self-employment of the youth. They also give opportunity to the school dropouts to learn vocational skills; and the trainings capacitate them with life coping skills and to develop entrepreneurship to start their own enterprises and run them profitably.



#### 7.1 St. Francis De Sales Technical School, Imphal

SFS Technical School, Imphal conducts vocational skill development on printing, DTP, Note book making, book binding and Basics of computer. 18 students passed out from the centre during this year. 80% of them were school dropouts who are from economically backward families. All the trainees are given stipends to meet their food and accommodation expenses. They undergo a comprehensive training for one year, learning basic computer applications, DTP, Printing, Book Binding, and Note Book making. Life coping skills and entrepreneurship development programme



are also integral part of the curriculum along with technical skills.

#### 7.2 St. Frnacis De Sales Technical School, Diphu

SFS Technical School, Diphu provides skill development on six trades: computer, book binding, printing, driving, carpentry and welding. It is mainly for the school dropout boys and girls from poor families, who have interest and aptitude. Soft skills and entrepreneurship development are part of the curriculum. This centre also offers placement to the trainees who successfully complete the training programme. Statistics during the reporting period is given below:

#### 8. Educational Sponsorship Programme - Fransalian Kinder Mission (FKM)

Sponsorship programmes support students from poor families to continue their education. Under this program, education fees, boarding fees etc are supported for the children who are financially weak and with aptitude for education. The scholarship enables them to continue their high school level studies and some even to post graduation or professional courses. The detail of achievements during 2010-11 is as follows.

#### 9. Promotion of health and Housing (P. H. H)

Health of an individual or community is the result of a complex interaction of many factors. Water, food, sanitation, clothing, housing, education, employment and a host of other social, economic and cultural factors play their role. There is a strong link between people's health and the development of the area and the State as a whole. FAsCE India believes that poor health.

- reduces life expectancy
- prevents educational achievement

- diminishes productivity
- increases poverty and inequity

Poverty leads to the vicious circle of malnutrition, low level of education, disease, poor housing and lack of access to health care services.

FAsCE India initiated a process for providing basic health and hygiene of the rural population of remote areas of Arunachal Pradesh where basic health care



facilities are not available. The primary approaches of FAsCE India are

- promotion of Preventive & Social Medicines
- working for de addiction
- participating in TB Control Programme
- working with HIV/AIDS
- promotion of low cost housing
- rain water harvesting etc.

Health development through community health education and services have considerably improved the health status of people. FAScE India has been implementing community based heath programme in the remote areas where health facilities are not easily accessible to people. Its mission is to enrich the quality of life of the target groups by creating a sustainable, nurturing, professional environment through caring, and personalized service. More than 150 villages have been covered through various programmes related to health including medical camps, awareness programmes, counseling services, clinics and dispensaries.

Dispensaries are at function in Kaying, West Siang District of Arunachal Pradesh; Tening, in Peren District of Nagaland; and Bahalpur, in Dhubri District of Assam.

Number of awareness programmes was conducted in the above cited centres on HIV and AIDS and Malaria during the year.

#### **Case Study**

Ankita is a 14 year old Adivasi girl from Choibari Tea estate, Chapper, Assam. She says "I would not be what I am today if not for the help given by FAsCE India". She was a school dropout from class 8, hailing from a poor family. Since then she worked as a domestic worker in one of the houses in her neighborhood. Her parents encouraged her in the work for she was a contributing member to the family.

She is now pursuing her education and studies in class IX. She tells that "now I am aware what my right to education mean. My dream is to become a nurse and serve the community".
