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PROTECTION OF ENVIRONMENT

FAsCE India "Connecting People to Nature" on World Environment Day 2017

Global warming has become an undeniable reality today. There is a massive influx of natural disasters, warming and cooling periods, different types of weather patterns etc. Thus Our planet is poised at the brink of a severe environmental crisis. Current environmental problems require urgent attention to be addressed globally as well as locally and work responsibly, individually as well as collectively. Joining hands with the rest of the global community to reduce the environmental crisis, FAsCE India observed the World Environment Day in a unique way on 5th June 2017. The World Environment Day was observed in different centres namely - Narengi, Somonpara and Amsing Jorabat, to take forward the theme of the year 'Connecting People to Nature' to protect and save the Mother Earth.

Narengi, Guwahati: In Guwahati at the Head office, the event was marked by clusters of events viz., street play by FAsCE Supplementary children, An Awareness Rally, Planting & Distribution of Saplings etc. Addressing on the occasion at the LG Tower premises at Narengi, the Chief Guest Smt. Archana Goswami, President of MATRI urged the gathering to be citizens to protect environment by planting trees and preventing deforestation. She also exhorted the children of Jyoti Niketan Blind School for melodious presentation of a song based on Environment and the children of FAsCE Supplementary Education Centre, Narengi for the street play to reach out the message of protection of environment. The short inaugural program was followed by the Awareness Rally flagged off by Smt. Lita Hazarika, Secretary of MATRI. More than 280 participants partook in the rally, with colourful festoons and slogans to spread the message of green and clean environment. The rally culminated at SFS Higher Secondary School, Satgaon with the concluding programme of planting a sapling in the SFS School premises by Fr. Emmanuel M.T. Regional Superior of MSFS Dibrugarh Region. Then saplings of various kinds were distributed to the members of FAsCE SHGs and FAsCE Supplementary children. Fr. Clean Areng, Associate Director of FAsCE India appreciated MATRI, FAsCE SHGs and the FAsCE Supplementary Children for their participation in observing the day with FAsCE India.



Somonpara : In Somonpara, FAsCE India zonal office observed the day with cleanliness drive and planting around 300 plants around the SFS School campus and at Bolori Bazar locality. The Chief Guest Ms. Popi Marak, inaugurated the programme and exhorted the students, and SHGs leaders to protect the forest and save the trees.





Amsing Jorabat: The world Environment Day was also observed in the rural area of Amsing Jorabat where the SHGs and Federation members came together and organized the event at the Anganwadi Centre amidst the children and community. The importance of the day was highlighted by the President of the Federation. Later in order to impart the message to the people around the saplings were distributed and planted around the Anganwadi Centre. In her address President of the Federation said that we can in our small way contribute towards our mother earth to sustain and remain green. She urged her SHG members those who are using the old mode of cooking with firewood to abandon and use some new modes of pollution free energies.

SHG A TOOL FOR EMPOWERMENT AND SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

FAsCE SHGs, Guwahati

Self-help leads to 'self-reliance' of Self Help Groups. Thus, self-help promotion is a deliberate effort of FAsCE India to facilitate better functioning of FAsCE SHGs, so that they become self-reliant institutions of the marginalized and needy people. The second quarter of this year was an eventful one for the self-help groups of Guwahati.

Livelihood Support to deserving SHGs at Narengi : 17 eligible Women Self Help Groups of FAsCE SHGs were given livelihood support revolving fund on May 14, 2017 by Rev. Fr Saji George MSFS, Executive Director of FAsCE India. The awardees were chosen on account of their stable level of savings and good performance in terms of other requisite indicators.



The recipients of Livelihood support will be investing the amount for various income generating activities such as Poultry farm, Pig rearing, Rosary making, Candle making, Mushroom cultivation, Weaving, Petty

Shops etc. SHG account books were also verified on the occasion to check their maintenance and regularity. Each group has maximum of 12 members.



The support given is in the form of revolving fund which is returned to the organization during the period of 10 months time.

Monthly Meetings : Monthly meeting is an essential part of all the SHGs of FAsCE India. In order to strengthen the groups, SHGs meet every month to discuss and plan their activities. They resolve the key issues the members come across or if the group experiences anything of such problems. Individually, the poor people are weak and lack resources to solve their problems. When the group tries to help its members, it becomes easier for them to face the difficulties and come up with solutions.





Food processing Training : FAsCE India Self Help Group members of Amsing Jorabat participated in a three days food processing training from the 6th - 8th June 2017, held in the community premises itself. The three days training programme includes fruits and vegetable preservation and nutritional education which was organized by Government of India under the Ministry of Women and Child Development in collaboration with Food and Nutrition Board, Community Food and Nutrition Extension Unit. Mr. Apurba Das, Laboratory Assistant and Ms. Pabitra Talukdar, Laboratory Attendant of the Food and Nutrition Board had conducted the training sessions.

The ladies were taught to make sweet lime (mosumber) squash, mixed fruit jam, tomato sauce, papaya chutney, guava jam, eggplant chutney and many more things. They were taught all these recipes with ingredients that are found easily in the kitchen. The training was conducted so that the ladies could make an earning by making all these and market it out in the suitable outlets. FAsCE India women's coordinator Ms. Chaya Kalita and Ms. Anisha Sheikh, MASW intern from TISS, Guwahati were there to monitor the training. The participants paid fees of Rupees Twenty Five to the Food and Nutrition Board towards registration and at the end of the training the members were given certificates of participation.

Community Resource Person (CRP) selected from FAsCE SHG, Guwahati :

Mrs. Nirabati Roy, President of Mohini Self Help Group and President of Nabajagriti Federation has been selected as the Community Resource Person (CRP) by the Guwahati Municipal Corporation. The selection was done from 31 SHGs under the Urban Development Scheme of the Corporation. Soon after the selection Mrs. Nirabati attended the Capacity Building and Training Programme at National Institute for Rural Development, Khanapara from 5th - 8th June 2017. The resource-persons were from NIRD, Andhra Pradesh. This programme intended to build capacity of community-level resource persons to transfer knowledge on basic concepts of SHGs to the people.



FAsCE SHGs, Somonpara

Ever Since the launch of the project at Somonpara, there has been a progressive change in the lives of the people. The active community participation has made the difference in bringing about changes. The clear signs of change was seen especially a better and clean surrounding through clean drive programmes, equipping themselves to be better leaders through various leadership and capacity building programmes, gaining knowledge in handling accounts, and registration process etc. Formation and strengthening of self help groups for improved livelihood is a project supported by MISEREOR. With a goal of sustainable and improved socio-economic, education and healthy living conditions for people of Somonpara, West Garo Hills, Meghalaya.



Book Keeping Training Programme : Two days Book-keeping training programme was organized for the 40 SHGs of Somonpara at the FAsCE India zonal office premises on 27th and 28th April 2017. The book-keeping training programme began with an inaugural function. The occasion was graced by the Chief Guest Mrs. Sadya Rani Sangma, MDC of Dengnakpara. The guests of honour Rev. Fr. Saji George MSFS, Director of FAsCE India, Rev. Fr. Clean Areng MSFS, Associate Director and the resource persons Ms. Chaya Kalita and Sr. Margaret MPV from FAsCE India were present for the inaugural function. Addressing the 65 participants and the staff members, the Chief Guest encouraged the SHG members and appreciated their efforts in building their community. The Director of FAsCE India laid emphasis on the participation of SHG leaders and members in such capacity building programmes for effective functioning and standardization of SHG activities.

During the training sessions the resource-persons highlighted the importance of accurate book keeping for long term stability of SHG; timely reporting was demonstrated as the strength of SHGs; importance of documentation for loan and asset, quality, efficiency and sustainability. The two day training concluded with a very positive note as the participants expressed that it was very useful for them in taking their work forward.



First Year Annual Evaluation

On May 28, 2017, the FAsCE India team visited Somonpara to conduct the first year Annual Evaluation. This evaluation was to assess the extent to which the primary objective of the first year of the project has been achieved. During the evaluation, the project team and staff members shared their work, the challenges and impact of the various activities conducted under the project. Fr. Saji George, Executive Director of FAsCE India checked the books and registers maintained by the SHG office-bearers. And he had also discussed the second year timeline activities of the project and suggestions were given for enhancing their activities for better results.



The two main methods used in carrying out the end of project evaluation were document reviews and key informant interviews. The documents reviewed included: Project work-plans, Activity tracking sheets, project progress reports and activity specific project reports, minutes of meetings, newspaper reports and copies of training manuals and guidelines used in the project. During the evaluation, the team had also visited Chigitchakgre, Chibasal and also met the cluster level SHG leaders at Gambegre village.

Leadership Training Programme for SHG Leaders

A day-long leadership training programme for SHG leaders was conducted on 5th June 2017 at FAsCE India zonal office, Somonpara. The objective of the training programmes on Leadership was to impart knowledge, sharpen skills and orient attitudes of participants so that they are capable of performing better in their roles as leaders based on the situations. 76 leaders from the 40 SHGs participated in the programme. The sessions were conducted by the resource person Ms. Popi Marak from Mahila Shakti Kendra, Balipara, Sonitpur, Assam. At the end of the programme Fr. John



Kelamkuzhackal MSFS, expressed his gratitude to the resource person for animating the sessions and the participants for their keen interest and active participation.

Staff Training Programme

Staff capacity building programme was held on 6th June 2017 in Somonpara. The focus of this training was to orient the staff and familiarize them with the goals, responsibilities and aspects of book keeping. During the sessions various games and methods of conducting group-meetings were introduced to the staff for making the meetings interesting and participatory. Staffs were trained to acquire the capability and competence to maintain and manage the SHGs in a productive way. As prerequisite for seeking institutional scheme support, they were imparted knowledge of how to grade the SHGs, status of SHGs, profile of SHGs, Loan schedule of SHG members and the trial balance etc. Ms. Popi Marak was the resource person for the training programme. The day long programme concluded with the vote of thanks proposed by Sr. Anupa Francis, Animator of FAsCE India, zonal office and field staff Mr. Thirsthy Marak led the



PROTECTION & PROMOTION OF CHILD RIGHTS

Workshop on Child Protection Policy

The workshop on Child Protection Policy was organized with a view to capacitate the various stake holders with necessary skills to intervene and address this issue on a priority basis to set new trends in the society. It was held from 1st to 2nd April 2017 in MSFS Provincialate, Narengi, Guwahati.

The workshop took off with short inaugural function Fr. Saji George MSFS, Executive Director; FAsCE India welcomed the guest invitees and the participants to the workshop. Rev. Fr. George Panthanmackel, Provincial of MSFS Northeast India delivered the keynote address highlighting the importance of the programme in the present scenario. As a symbolic gesture of inauguration the ceremonial lamp was lit by the Rev. Fr. S. Christu Das, Fr. Kurian MSFS, Sr. Margaret MPV, participant delegates and the honored guests. 60 MSFS priests and 40 sisters from the 45 MSFS centres and schools of Northeast region participated in the programme.



During the course of the workshop the group discussions, PowerPoint presentations and interactions made the sessions very participatory and lively. This gave an opportunity to the participants for a better understanding of the topic and the idea of Child Protection and strength found as a group of institutions to work together to achieve the standard for child protection to be effective and structured to help institutions to think through the issues and develop their own approach to child protection. Information sheets and hand-outs on Child Protection Policy outline, Possible Indicators of Abuse, and Code of Conduct materials were distributed. A detailed session was taken on Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act 2012.

The workshop concluded with an evaluation and valedictory function. During the evaluation one of the participants expressed that it was one of the important topic which is to be addressed and such trainings equip the caregivers, teachers and those in authority to create a child-friendly and child safety environment. During the valedictory function

certificate of participation was distributed to the participants by Fr. Saji George, Executive Director of FAsCE India and Fr. S. Christu Das, Director of Social Initiatives for Growth and Networking, Ranchi, Jharkhand the resource person and the vote of thanks was proposed by Fr. Clean Areng, Associate Director of FAsCE India.

FAsCE India Partnering in the Launch of Children's Manifesto Under UNICEF


It was an yearlong consultation, planning, discussion and preparation in starting The Adolescent and Children's Network, Assam (ACRN) under the leadership of UNICEF, Assam and North East Society for the Promotion of Youth and Masses (NESP YM). It was the first of its kind in whole of North East Region, in fact in whole of india, where children become the part of the planning and setting manifesto for their own rights. It was also the effort of many child-focused organisations across Assam especially from Guwahati, Tezpur, Kokrajhar and Jorhat zones that worked together to ensure Children's rights are promoted, protected and fulfilled. FAsCE India was one of the invited organizations to involve in the process of formulation of children's Manifesto.



Two children from Supplementary Education Centre, Master Aryan Purbey and Miss Nurnahar Siddihika, were the representatives from FAsCE India. Rev. Fr. Clean Areng MSFS, Associate Director and Ms. Chaya Kalita, Women's Coordinator of FAsCE India participated in the the formal launch of the Adolescent and Child Rights Network, Assam (ACRNA) and the release of the Adolescents' and Children's Manifesto for Assam on April 6, 2017 in Hotel Lily, Guwahati. Smt. Runumi Gogoi, Chairperson in-charge, ASCPCR formally launched the Network and released the Children's Manifesto.

FAsCE SUPPLEMENTARY EDUCATION CENTRES

Importance of Schooling - School has become the first stepping stone in the life of a child, wherein he/she learns a lot more than just rote learning. Developing hobbies, refining them, learning basic etiquettes, getting skilled at multi tasking, developing social skills are some of the many things that a school equips a child with. FAsCE India Women's Coordinator made a facilitation visit to FAsCE Supplementary Education Centre at Bongaon Village, to review and evaluate the progress of the centre. The teachers mentioned that two students namely Anita A Sangma and Nayan A Sangam have been enrolled in the school for the new academic session. These children were out-of-school due to difficult situations at home. The teacher of the centre took interest in motivating these children to attend the centre. During the course of time Mrs. Chameli Marak the teacher, found that they were very keen on learning and were quick to grasp the teaching. Within very short time they learned to read and write. Now Anita and Nayan are continuing their schooling with steady progress under the guidance of their teacher, Mrs. Chameli Marak.



Creativity a milestone for children's overall development



The core aim of education is to foster all round development of a child. All round development essentially means intellectual, physical, moral, sensible and social development. To fulfill these objectives, there is a prime need of striking a balance between syllabus, curriculum, books and also co-curricular activities beyond that. A co-curricular activity essentially takes place outside a typical pen and pencil classroom experience. It gives the students an opportunity to develop particular skills and exhibit their non-academic abilities. Hence, the Narengi centre has initiated co-curricular activities beside the regular studies. The children were given opportunities to showcase



their talents individually and in group. The activities include solo dance, group dance, recitation, debate, group discussion, drawing and singing etc.

Orphan Children Rehabilitated : timely Intervention of FAsCE India helped the orphaned children living in extreme poverty in Amsing Jorabat to be rehabilitated. One and a half year ago, both parents were diagnosed with tuberculosis and they succumbed to the disease. Their paternal uncle and aunt took the responsibility of looking after three children aged ten, six and four respectively. But the family was finding difficult to support both their own children and the orphans since they were in utter poverty hailing from Satgaon slum colony.

After the intervention of FAsCE India the matter was taken to Child Welfare Committee. Accordingly, the CWC issued an order to rehabilitate the children to Snehalaya for their care and protection. Owing to their poor health conditions the children were later shifted to Missionaries of Charity in Jalukbari, Guwahati for much needed medical care.



PROMOTION OF HEALTH



Follow up Medical Camp for the Inmates of Guwahati Central Jail - With a motto to visit and offer healthcare service to the inmates of Guwahati Central Jail, a free medical camp was organized on 29th June 2017. The medical camp was a collaborative endeavor of FAsCE India with the Prison Ministry of Northeast India. 203 inmates, including both men and women benefitted from this camp. They were screened for various diseases and follow up was also done from the previous visits for some of the patients. The Superintendent of the Central Jail and his staff offered their support and encouragement in holding the day-long health camp. A team of 13 doctors and medical experts from Swahid Jadav Nath Government Homeopathic College, Panjabari extended their support in providing free healthcare services.

Sr. Letitia, the Regional Coordinator of NE Prison Ministry of India, Fr. Saji George, Executive Director and Fr. Clean Areng, Associate Director along with FAsCE India staff were present for coordinating and the smooth functioning of the camp. The Central Jail authorities, the Superintendent, Jailor and Assistant Jailor extended their whole hearted support and appreciated the initiative of FAsCE India.



INTERNATIONAL DAYS OF IMPORTANCE

Mothers' Day Celebration : The day that celebrates the essence of a mother is Mothers' Day. Mothers' Day is one of those occasions that none of us can effort to miss. Keeping this bonding emotion in mind on 14th May 2017, the Children of FAsCE Supplementary Education Centre, Narengi presented different colourful dances to showcase their love for their mothers. The heart-warming gestures of the children gave immense joy to all the mothers . Fr. Saji George, the Director of FAsCE India shed light on the role of the mother and mentioned that her role is foremost in shaping the growth, personality and upbringing of a child.



World Day Against Child Labour : FAsCE India observed the World Day Against Child Labour with 120 children of FAsCE Supplementary Education Centre from the neighbourhood. The programme was focused on creating awareness among the children on the various vulnerable situations leading to Child Labour with a purpose to equip them with proper information and guidance to defend themselves from such violation. Fr. John Barman MSFS, animated the young Participants with videos on the topic, highlighting that child labour deprives children of their childhood, their



potential and their dignity that is harmful to physical, emotional and mental development. Education and Empowerment of Children is one of the key areas of Fransalian Agency for Social Care and Education. Under the theme "A Child Labour Free Neighbourhood through Education and Community Participation" an effort was initiated in 2015 with the sole aim to eradicate and prevent child labour and dropout of school children in and around Narengi and the surrounding villages, under Kamrup Rural and Metro Districts of Guwahati, Assam. The impact can be seen in the regular attendance of the children in school and tuition centre, no drop-outs has been reported during this period as education is given importance. The participation of parents, members of the community and the various stakeholders from the civil society during the special events and programmes has been encouraging and motivating force for the children and the FAsCE India team to carry forward this effort to accomplish its objective of no child labour.
